UPDATE ON BUILDING WORKS -TREASURY ROOF

You will have noticed the presence of scaffolding in the south west corner of the cathedral to allow for the removal of the old heating flue. Once this has been done, the wall will be lime-washed ready to take the new Royal Engineers memorial. Scaffolding is also being installed, externally, on the north east corner of the Cathedral to allow for much needed repairs to the treasury roof and the masonry around the windows. I expect the scaffolding to be in situ for some months and I hope repairs will be finished in the summer. Colin Tolhurst.


From the Dean's desk

As this edition of the Beacon arrives with you I'm well in to my plans for a sabbatical, which I'm taking from May to July. I was ordained 25 years ago, in 1985 - the year that the Church of England produced its seminal report about urban deprivation, Faith In The City. I'm going to be looking at the ways in which the Church is still engaged with urban ministry around the country, and asking if the flame of our commitment to some of the toughest parts of our cities is still burning brightly.

It was Archbishop William Temple who is attributed with saying that the church is the only organisation in the world that exists solely for the benefit of its non-members. It's a challenging saying, but it reminds me that all of the projects and work that we fund here have to serve a higher purpose - ultimately we're not raising money for the Cathedral, but to liberate the Cathedral to best serve its community.










Paul Spooner-Lillingston – London Marathan

Paul Spooner-Lillingston, father of one of our boy choristers, is running the London Marathon this year in support of Rochester Cathedral's boys choir and the Heart of Kent Hospice. Here he writes about his reason for doing so.

"...Whilst attending Evensong I was struck by the following thought. Here are around 16 boys and their mentors working their hearts out to achieve excellence - including miniscule detail – away from the glare and the 'glitz' of huge numbers of public audience; this would have



gone on at this standard had we not been there and it was a true team effort. So why mention it here, then? Well, it reminded me that everything that the choir do every day of the year, in all its detail, and however unseen by those outside, is in so many ways just as important as the 'big stage' showcase events – it is of course the former that makes the latter so successful..."

Although my late father's stay in the Hospice was very short, the care and attention he received during that time made his passing very peaceful and easier for my mother and our family to accept. We, too, are very grateful for the care shown to us by everyone at the Hospice. With this year being the 10th anniversary of my father's passing I felt that this was a great opportunity to thank them as well as provide the team of professionals and volunteers who provide specialist palliative care to the people of Maidstone and the surrounding local communities with much needed funding."

Ancient Stones – Untold Stories

Rochester Cathedral Interpretation Project





You may be forgiven for thinking that the installation of the glass doors signals the end of the HLF project. Well, you'd be wrong! In fact, in many ways the most important work is being developed and delivered as we speak – and will continue to do so for the next two years. 'What work is this?' I hear you cry. Let us elaborate...



In January members of an art group run by local artist Wendy Daws and funded by Kent Association of the Blind (KAB) began a six week 'residency' in the Cathedral. The group members, all of whom are retired and with a variety of degrees of visual impairment

have been using the Cathedral as inspiration for their work which includes photography, drawing and sculpture. They will return in the summer for a further stint. We are aiming to

create an interactive 'trail' of their work, exhibited at various sites around the Cathedral environs during October. This coincides with the national festival The Big Draw, which aims to raise awareness of the many types of drawing and the methods which can be used. The KAB art project will seek to challenge the need for 20/20 vision to create interesting, engaging, interpretative work and will explore notions of drawing other than with pencil and paper.

At the opposite end of the age scale, in February the Education Department held a Family Fun Day for children from the age of 18 months to 80 years plus! Visitors that day were able to take part in a variety of activities – from making a mitre, brass rubbing, Morris dancing and parachute games, through to heraldry and a bracelet workshop run by the Sunday Club. Our Special guest for the day was Eggie the Eagle – who had flown in especially from her new roost in the treasury roof scaffolding to meet some of her fans. She seems to have enjoyed the day as much as the children and all in all it was a fantastic day with over 500 visitors between 10am and 2pm, half of which were young people.

MOPA Theatre Company will be performing Shakespeare's Macbeth in the

JOHN O'GROATS TO LAND'S END



For those of you that are not aware of this, in July the Very Rev'd Adrian Newman, Dean of Rochester is cycling alone from John O'Groats to Land's End. His route will take him on a 1,000 mile journey which he will do over the course of two weeks.

He is doing this as part of a sabbatical, and in order to raise money to support the Cathedral's music tradition. Someone once described Choral Evensong as "the

greatest free show on Earth". The reality is that it is free but far from cheap, and Cathedral music is in danger of disappearing from the English cultural landscape without a significant injection of funding. He hopes that 1,000 people will sponsor him a penny a mile for 1,000 miles – this will only cost £10 but will enable him to hit his target of £10,000 in total.

Adrian says, "Ever since I was a boy, and my eldest brother walked from Land's End to John O'Groats, I've had an ambition to do something similar. I've decided to add a bit to the traditional length of the ride in order to make it into a 1000-mile challenge. I know it won't be easy, but the physical challenge is part of the attraction for me. And I'm very pleased that I can raise money along the way towards keeping the musical tradition at Rochester Cathedral alive".

NEWSFLASH: TEXTUS ROFFENSIS comes home...

Rochester Cathedral is delighted to announce that the Textus Roffensis will be on public display this summer for the first time since 2004. It is a rare opportunity to view this fascinating text.

Textus Roffensis is a Rochester Cathedral book of the early 12th century that holds some of the most significant legal texts issued by England's various early medieval kingdoms going back to the laws of King Æthelbert of Kent (c. 604). It also preserves abundant records from one of England's earliest episcopal sees. A conference will be held from 25th – 27th July and will gather, for the first time, work in the disciplines of history, English, linguistics, political science and codicology in order to address the context for the creation of Textus Roffensis, the language of its texts, English laws and their legal, political, and cultural agendas, the relationship of the Church and royal government, and the legacy of the book and its texts. There will be featured talks by Martin Brett (University of Cambridge), Nicholas Brooks (University of Birmingham), Carole Hough (University of Glasgow), Mary Richards (University of Delaware); a private tour of Rochester Cathedral; and a private exhibition of Textus Roffensis itself and Rochester and Canterbury Cathedral papers of the same period. Michael Wood, broadcaster and historian of early medieval England, will deliver a public lecture on the legacy of Textus Roffensis.
