# Roman Wall Reception

The masonry conservation work has now been completed on The Roman Wall at the East end of the Cathedral and we were pleased to hold a Reception on Thursday 12th May to celebrate it. The Dean, The Very Revd Adrian Newman introduced the Cathedral Archaeologist, Graham Keevil, who gave some background information on how the work was done and the discoveries that came from it. Grateful thanks were expressed to Peter Kendall from English Heritage for their part funding of the work, and to Biffaward, in their absence, for their match funding.

We were very pleased to have the Cathedral Guides present who said they were very pleased to hear the history of the wall and are now able to pass that knowledge onto their tour groups.

## Cinema in the Nave

### Whistle Down the Wind

On 23rd September we are pleased to present a viewing in the nave of Richard Attenborough's classic film "Whistle Down the Wind" made in 1961 and starring Hayley Mills, Bernard Lee and Alan Bates.

The plot follows the lives of three children who discover a fugitive hiding in their barn. The bearded man, referred to as "Blakey" by the Police, is mistaken for Jesus by the children. The fugitive makes no attempt to correct their mistake, especially when he discovers the eldest child, Kathy, is determined to protect him from discovery by the local Police.

This is a film showing how the children's innocent faith contrasts with the pragmatic and suspicious adults in the town. Lots of parallels are to be found, from the stable and the shepherds, to the disciples and "Peter's denial".

Spring 2011 has been the season of training - dusting off the little grey cells ready for an action packed summer of welcoming visitors of all ages! The new guides have now completed their course and are eagerly awaiting the results, new education volunteers have begun training to work with visiting schools, and Pam Alexander has been leading members from the whole education team in sessions on exploring spirituality through dance. Over three sessions we interpreted a Psalm, a Bible narrative and Rublev's icon of the Trinity in dance. No floaty steps, pirouettes or high

kicks – instead we worked collaboratively to communicate our understanding through a series of static poses linked by gentle controlled movement. A fantastic team-building experience; a brilliant mind, body and spirit workout. The photographic evidence is being kept under lock and key!

This summer will also be a time of reflection and review as the “Ancient Stones – Untold Stories” project draws to a close. Thanks to HLF funding changes and new developments have widened our audience and improved the visitor experience. Our work now is to keep up the good work and continue to strive for excellence!

## TO THEE I BEQUEST...

(The first in our series of Bequest anecdotes)

No one likes to think about their own mortality but alas death comes to all of us. But I don't want to depress you by reminding you that you really must have a Will no matter how meagre your estate. Instead, have a chuckle and muse at the queerness of folk by journeying through some weird and wonderful bequests over the centuries.

Henry Budd in 1862 left £200,000 in trust for his two sons on the condition that neither grew a moustache.

Anthony Scott's will read 'To my first wife Sue, whom I always promised to mention in my Will. Hello Sue'.

A condition in Edith Walsall's Will was that her vast estate was not to be spent on slow horses and fast women.

Sara Clarke's will read 'I leave £1.00 to my daughter for the kindness and love she has never shown me'.

Norman Digweed in 1897 left £26,000 'for Jesus Christ should he return. Many people made a claim but the money was nevertheless passed on to the Crown in 1977 as a result of the application of the perpetuity rule. In a similar thread, a woman in Cherokee County, North Carolina left her entire fortune to God. The court actually instructed the county sheriff to find God. A few days later the sheriff returned and submitted his report with the conclusion that 'after due and diligent search God cannot be found in this county.

In 1851 J M W Turner after giving his paintings to the nation, left the rest 'for the support of the poor and decayed artists born in England of English parents'. His relatives fought and won claiming the whole £140,000 a fortune in today's money. The artists received nothing.

An Australian Francis Lord left a shilling for his wife 'for tram fare so she can go somewhere and drown herself'. The inheritance was never claimed.

There was the legacy that was left so that a church could employ someone to shake a bird-scaring rattle in services to stop people dropping off during the sermon.

So as you can see, a Will can have many purposes. It is not just essential in order to ensure your hard earned cash goes to the right people and your loved ones are well cared for but it can be a tool to get things off your chest. Even by blatantly ignoring a mention, the Will can serve a useful purpose.

So don't wait for the tomorrow that never seems to come. TheTV show will still be there, the pint at the pub will also still be there but one thing's for sure, you will one day not be around. So go on make the move, take care of the ones you love and the causes you care about, you know it makes sense.

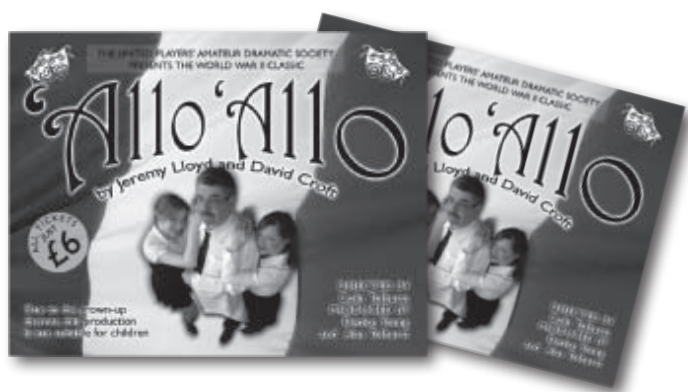
